### JESSIE McCORMACK

JOLENE, A WAITRESS who idolizes Dolly Parton, her rival co-worker and their eccentric boss are all changed forever when a stranger's car breaks down in their sleepy southern town. The world premiere of Jessie McCormack's dramedy, Journey to Dollywood, leads Jolene on a trip of self-discovery.

"It's a play about courage," explains McCormack who plays Jolene. "Dolly Parton is a symbol of hope. She's the American dream personified, a person who struggled against all odds to get where she is today. Jolene's desire to travel to Dollywood is a metaphor for taking a leap of faith and going for what you want in life."

"I was charmed when I read it," says Atlantic Theatre Company member Rod McLachlan, who directs. "Jessie is a writer who can deliver surprising, yet fully motivated changes in tone." Parton liked the script so much she recorded a voiceover for the play and hopes to attend a performance. In June, McCormack visited her at her recording studio in Nashville, Tennessee.

#### **VELINA HASU HOUSTON**

HOW DO WE AS HUMAN BEINGS find solace following a tragic act of violence that has changed the world and our lives forever? Inspired by the true story of the "Hiroshima Maidens," a group of

women who had been disfigured by the nuclear blast in Japan, Velina Hasu Houston's world premiere, Calling Aphrodite, explores mankind's ability to heal and build a better world.

After visiting the Hiroshima Peace Park with her children, Houston searched for a way to write about the experience that would resonate in today's society. "The Peace Park is a very positive memorial," she says. "It left me reinvigorated and with a sense of hope for the future of our world."

harmony and cross-cultural understanding. It humanizes the horrors of war and sends a strong and optimistic message to future generations."

### **CLINTON LEUPP**

UNIVERSALLY ACKNOWLEDGED as a member of drag royalty, Miss Coco Peru has had four theatrical runs at the LA Gay & Lesbian Center in addition to such films as trick and TV shows as Will & Grace. In the latest endeavor, the world premiere of Ugly Coco, the creation of actor/writer Clinton Leupp, Miss Coco starts at her childhood and follows the trajectory of her life from boyhood to manhood to womanhood.

Leupp, who was nominated for an Ovation Award for his 2003 production of Miss Coco Peru is Undaunted, is known for transcending simple camp values and entering the realm of true theatre on his path to gender-bending notoriety.

He has been praised for "single-handedly resurrecting the lost art of telling a story that takes the audience on a long, very amusing and emotionally cathartic journey," according to CinemaStage Magazine. Michael Schiralli directs the venture which is produced by Howard Hill and Jon Imparato.
